SCHOOL RESUMES AUGUST 19TH

Where did the summer go? The school bells will be ringing soon, and, yes, it is a little earlier than last year, but only by a day. The first day of school for all students, including kindergarten, is August 19th. The 2009 kindergarten class will attend school three days a week (Tuesday- Thursday) from the beginning of the school year, rather than starting with two days the first semester and then going to the three day schedule the second semester as has been in the past.

Registration for new students, kindergarten, and grades 6-12 will be held on Thursday, August 13th, from 1:30-3:00. Sports physicals will also be conducted on August 13th and will include grades 3-12. Boys' physicals have been set up for 1:30 with the girls' to follow at 2:00.

Boys' and girls' basketball, as well as girls' volleyball, will again be in a co-op with Grenora. To simplify things, all three sports will be playing a Montana schedule this year, rather than a North Dakota schedule for girls' basketball and volleyball, and Montana schedule for boys' basketball. Boys' and girls' junior varsity and varsity basketball games will be played on the same night and Westby and Grenora will split the home games for all sports. As in the past, the boys will be co-opping with Plentywood for football.

All personnel assignments for the new school year including teachers, cooks, custodians and bus drivers will remain the same with the exception of the music position. Upon Greg Janick's resignation, Jill Garman of Bainville was hired to fill the position. Jill and her husband, Shane, are both natives of Bainville and ranch along with their five children. After graduation from MSU- Bozeman with a degree in elementary education, Jill taught in Wyoming for three years. She then took a hiatus from teaching for nine years to be at home with her children. For the past five and one-half years, Jill has taught at Bainville while earning her masters in music. Jill and her five children, ranging in age from 10-year old twins to a 15-year old sophomore, will be spending the week in Westby and most likely returning to the ranch on the weekend when sports aren't an issue. Jill is very excited to start her position in Westby. When asked about her thoughts on her families new adventure, Jill responded, "Westby is known for its strong academic standards, appears to be very family oriented and likes to compete. All great qualities. I am very excited about the opportunity to teach here."

Clare Jonas Jensen, 86, of 800 40th St. S., an Army Air Corps veteran and retired Job Service employee, died of natural causes Friday, August 7th, 2009 at Peace Hospice.

His memorial service was 2:30 p.m. Monday at Faith Lutheran Church, with burial of ashes in Highland Cemetery. Schnider Funeral Home handled arrangements.

Clare was born Aug. 14, 1922, in the Daneville community near Westby, Mont., to Jonas Julius Jensen and Amy Gustava Meyer. After graduating from Westby High School in 1942, he proudly served his country in the Army Air Corps as a B-17 gunnery instructor during World War II. He was discharged as a staff sergeant.

While stationed in Laredo, Texas, he married the love of his life and high-school sweetheart, Ruth Marie Nelson, on April 24, 1944. Following his discharge from the service, Clare attended the University of North Dakota, and through his employment with Gambles and the Montana Job Service, he and Ruth lived in communities in North Dakota and Montana.

Most important in Clare's life was his family and friends. He was a dear father to his children and a very special grandfather to his grandchildren and

great-grandchildren. Among his many valued friends are Ross and Phyllis Floyd, with whom he and Ruth tallied innumerable pinochle games, and the members of the Friday Night Club, with whom he and Ruth enjoyed many meals and "old times" conversations.

Although Clare's leaving is of great sadness, he would say his was a life well-lived.

Survivors include his wife of 65 years, Ruth Jensen of Great Falls; a daughter, Diane Savage and husband Bob of Sidney; sons Neal Jensen and wife Pam, and Craig Jensen and wife Kaymarie of Great Falls; brothers Clinton Jensen and wife Mary of Corpus Christi, Texas; a sister, Yvonne Roble of West Covina, Calif.; seven grandchildren, Cami Jensen and husband Terry, Luke Savage and wife Tracy, Adam Jensen, Nathan Jensen, Ryan Savage, Aubrienne Kluver and husband Casey, and Karissa Jensen; and three great-grandchildren, Mikael, Matthew and Andrew Savage.

He was preceded in death by his parents and a brother, Glenn Jensen.

I'll warn you, this first recipe is dangerous. Arlene brought these brownies to our Fourth of July BBQ and I lost all control. Should you attempt this recipe I take no responsibility for the number you consume or the affect they may have on your waistline.

These dessert bars were named for Broadway because they're a hit every time they're served.

BROADWAY BROWNIE BARS

- **FILLING:**

- 6 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

- **BROWNIE:**

- 1/2 cup butter, cubed
- 1 square (1 ounce) unsweetened chocolate

- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup chopped walnuts

- **TOPPING:**

- 1 cup (6 ounces) semisweet chocolate chips

- 1/4 cup chopped walnuts
- 2 cups miniature marshmallows

- **FROSTING:**

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup milk
- 2 ounces cream cheese
- 1 square (1 ounce) unsweetened chocolate

- 3 cups confectioners' sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Directions:

In small bowl, combine the first six ingredients until smooth; set aside.

In a large saucepan over medium heat, melt butter and chocolate. Remove from the heat and cool. Stir in the eggs, and vanilla. Add the sugar, flour, baking powder and nuts, stirring until blended.

Spread batter in a 13-in. x 9-in. baking pan coated with cooking spray. Spread filling over batter. For topping, in small bowl, combine chocolate chips and nuts; sprinkle over filling.

Bake at 350° for 28 minutes or until almost set. Sprinkle with marshmallows; bake for 2 minutes longer.

For frosting, in a large saucepan, heat butter, milk, cream cheese and chocolate until melted; stirring until smooth. Remove from heat; stir in confectioners' sugar and vanilla. Immediately drizzle over marshmallows. Chill well; cut into bars. **Yield:** 2-1/2 dozen.

Robin and Karla make these Peanut Butter Cookies at the school and they are the best. I love the addition of oatmeal, aside from the fact they are nice and chewy, the addition of the oatmeal convinces me they are healthier, thus no guilt when I reach for seconds.

PEANUT BUTTER OATMEAL COOKIES

- 1 1/3 cups brown sugar
- 1 1/3 cups white sugar
- 1 cup margarine
- 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups peanut butter
- 1 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 2 cups flour
- 1 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 4 cups oatmeal

Cream the sugars and margarine together. Add the eggs. Beat well. Add peanut butter and mix. Mix flour, baking powder and soda. Stir into sugar mixture. Add vanilla and oatmeal. Mix well. Scoop on cookie sheet and flatten with a fork dipped in sugar. Bake 375 degrees for 10 minutes or until lightly browned.

Regular Meeting
August 10, 2009
7:00 P.M.

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Westby School District #3 was held on August 10, 2009. Jim Sundsted, Marty Westgard, Vance Meyer, Mr. Koterba and Arlene Hove were in attendance (Donna Sorenson arrived at 8:00 p.m.). Vice-Chairman Meyer called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m.

There were no visitors at this meeting.

The tentative agenda was reviewed; one announcement item was added, followed by a motion to approve by Westgard, seconded by Sundsted, AIF.

Arlene read the minutes of the June 10, 2009 regular meeting. Following no corrections or additions to these minutes they were approved and placed on file.

The May and June financial and investment interest reports were reviewed.

Public Comment None

Committee Reports: Buildings and Grounds

A. Mr. Koterba reported that the cement work north and east of the school has been completed; the kitchen floor tile and countertops in various locations around the school have been installed; and carpeting is complete in the four classrooms, with just the office storage room remaining. The locker room plumbing is done but the asbestos removal area has yet to be rebuilt and the heating/air conditioning split units are on hold until next summer. The new clock system should be installed this week.

Unfinished Business:

A. The Student Attendance/Excessive Absences Policy for grades 9-12, as drawn up by Mr. Koterba, was reviewed. Following discussion Meyer moved to adopt this policy, Westgard seconded, AIF.

New Business:

A. The Westby School Staff Handbook was reviewed following by a motion by Westgard to approve, Meyer seconded, AIF.

B. The Westby School Student Handbook was reviewed with the following additions: the new attendance policy, GPA classes, and the GPA requirements for Salutatorian and Valedictorian. Meyer moved to approve this handbook, Sundsted seconded, AIF.

DORGAN PROVISION WILL CLEAN UP FORTUNA RADAR STATION

(WASHINGTON, DC)

U.S. Senator Byron Dorgan (D-N.D.) announced today that he included a provision to clear and clean up the former Fortuna Air Force Radar Station in an appropriations bill making its way through the Senate.

Dorgan, a senior member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, included \$300,000 to clean up the unused radar station in the FY 2010 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations bill.

The funding will be used by Divide County to clear the dilapidated buildings and clean up the debris littered across the 104-acre former Fortuna Air Force Radar Station. The unused radar station presents a significant safety hazard, and cleaning up the land will allow the county and residents to benefit from this former federal site.

"This site has long since fallen into disrepair, which is a shame when it should be able to be used by the county," said Dorgan. "This was a federal installation, and the federal government has an obligation to clean it up so Divide County will be able to put the area to use for the community."

The legislation passed through the Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Subcommittee. It next goes to the full Senate Appropriations Committee for consideration.

Senior Congregate Meals now available at Charlie's Place

Westby seniors will now have a choice for Senior Meals. Charlie's Place will serve lunchtime Congregate Meals and Home Delivered Meals on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays beginning August 11. The Prairie Kitchen will continue to serve senior meals four days a week as well – Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday.

The Sheridan County Council on Aging offers these programs through contracts with local businesses. Congregate Meals provide senior citizens (those age 60 and over, as well as their spouses even if younger) free, nutritious meals and the opportunity to get out and socialize with others in their communities. Home Delivered Meals are available to seniors who for medical or other reasons are unable to dine outside their homes. Anyone who would like Home Delivered Meals should call either Council on Aging Coordinator Vicki Ruby or Public Health Director Kathy Jensen, both at 765-3410.

While both programs are offered at no cost to seniors, donations of \$3.00 per meal are requested to help keep the programs in effect. No one will be denied meals due to the inability to pay.
