

Who doesn't like "happy" feet? Healthy, well cared for feet make us happier and more balanced from head to toe. In steps registered nurse Jean Williams. "Feet are often a neglected area for a lot of people," Williams says. "And I'm here to remedy that problem."

While attending a family reunion in Bainville, Montana, last summer, Jean Williams saw an ad in the *Billings Gazette* for registered nurses needed at the Sheridan Memorial Hospital & Nursing Home in Plentywood. After much thought and discussing it with her husband back in Stevensville, Montana, she saw it as her "last hurrah" in the nursing field before retirement.



The salary package and sign on bonus being offered at Sheridan Memorial Hospital were also financially rewarding and on top of that, it would be a way to reconnect with her sister, Lorna Lagerquist, who resides in Westby and another sister not far away in Epping, ND. The final decision was made last fall to give up her job at the Stevensville Nursing Home and make the temporary move to Westby. While here,

Jean is making her home with Bob and Lorna Lagerquist.

While Jean is a registered nurse at the Plentywood Nursing Home she still sees the need for foot care. Over two years ago, she attended a two day, foot and nail care clinic in Eau Claire, Wisconsin, at the University of Wisconsin. Jean said, "When I did home health care, it was assumed that because I was a nurse, I could do foot care. I didn't believe that was true because I wasn't trained. It was real important for me to get that knowledge and I'm much more confident now that I have the training." Once Jean returned from her training she decided to start her own foot care business.

School Board Meeting Minutes

Regular Meeting
January 11, 2010
7:00 P.M.

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Westby School District #3 was held on January 11, 2010. Brenda Ryals, Vance Meyer, Donna Sorenson, Marty Westgard, Jim Sundsted, Mr. Koterba, Mr. Somppi and Arlene Hove were in attendance. Chairman Ryals called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m.

There were no visitors at this meeting.

The tentative agenda was reviewed, one announcement item and one new business item were added followed by a motion by Meyer to approve, seconded by Sundsted, AIF.

Arlene read the minutes of the December 14, 2009 regular meeting. Following one addition, these minutes were approved and placed on file.

The November Financial Report, as prepared by Mrs. Hove, was reviewed.

Public Comment None

Committee Reports: Mr. Koterba presented 2 bids from Bruco of Billings – one for re-finishing the gym floor and one for screening and re-finishing the stage. He has had good reports about the quality of their work. Sundsted moved to hire Bruco at their bids of \$2025 and \$720, respectively, Sorenson seconded, AIF.

- Prairie Engineering will open bids around mid-March for the heating/air conditioning units.
- Mr. Koterba has contacted a contractor about replacing the windows in the cafeteria, kitchen and music room and a bid should be forthcoming soon. These windows were not replaced when all the other windows were a few years ago.

Mid-January and all is right in my world. We lived through another cold snap of -30 to -35 only to rebound to plus 35 to 40, three or four days later. Gorgeous, gorgeous winter days with plenty of sunshine and little wind has been our pleasure this week, and much to my liking. Warm enough to get out and enjoy, yet cold enough to rosy the cheeks. We have turned the corner for no matter what old man winter throws our way, we know spring is just around the next bend.



Speaking of spring, a few years ago a friend shared with me a bit of spring and the love her Mother had for the beautiful Amaryllis plant. I have since taken to sharing this thoughtful gesture with others. For the past several years, around Thanksgiving time, I have purchased the giant bulbs, planted them and shared them with others so they may enjoy the vibrant trumpets that emerge soon after the first of the year. The blossoms of the ones I planted for myself have just opened and their beauty never ceases to amaze me. The color may surprise me, as it did this year, but never the beauty that emerges from the dried up ugly bulbs in just a matter of weeks. This parallel to our changing seasons, represented in the beauty of the first crocus' erupting from the otherwise barren ground, and the promise of things to come in this miracle, is not lost on me. Yes, a bit of spring in mid-January can brighten most any day.

The reality of it is, it is still winter and a good time to scour newspapers, magazines and books for new recipes. I have tried several lately that make the "A" list and probably just as many that went straight to "file 13". About a month ago, the *Plains Reporter* did an article on a soup contest hosted by the Sidney, Montana, Chamber of Commerce. The winning recipe, Halibut Chowder, was featured, as well as, other recipes from the winning contestant. Ironically, almost in passing, a small paragraph appeared between recipes mentioning another way to fix halibut.

As it turns out, this simple little note spurred me to try it for my folks and us. It was the easiest, most delicious way to fix halibut that I have found and we all loved it. Probably because neither Danny, nor I like a lot of sauce on our halibut or needs the fried fish, this will definitely be our go to recipe in the future.

The taste is reminiscent of lobster tail, firm and dense, sweet, but not nearly as rich. There really was little in the way of a recipe so I print this as I prepared it, the key being the 7-up.

POACHED HALIBUT

6-8 ounces of halibut per person

7-up to cover

Drawn butter for dipping

Cut fillets of halibut into 2 inch sections crossways. Soak in milk for 1-2 hours. Fill a straight-sided frying pan 2/3 full of 7-up. Bring to a boil. Pat fillets dry and add to 7-up. Reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes or until fish is cooked through. Remove and place on broiler pan coated with cooking spray. Brush with butter and sprinkle lightly with paprika. Broil just until lightly browned. Remove and serve with drawn butter.

I also tried the soup recipe. Here, I think any firm white fish would work or shrimp. I added a couple cooked potatoes cut into bite size pieces. It, too, was very tasty and complete served with a crusty bread.

HALIBUT CHOWDER

1 ½ cups chopped carrots

2 stalks celery, chopped

1 cup chopped onion

2 tablespoons parsley

1 teaspoon basil

1/3 cup butter

1/3 cup flour

1 tsp salt

¼ tsp pepper

½ tsp cayenne pepper

3 cups chicken broth

1 tsp lemon juice

1 can diced tomatoes

1 cup milk

1 can evaporated milk

10 ounces frozen corn, thawed

1 cup cheddar cheese

1 pound halibut, cut into bite size chunks.

Saute carrots, celery and onion in butter until tender, stir in flour, salt, pepper and cayenne pepper. Gradually stir in broth. Add lemon juice, mix well and bring to a boil. Cook and stir for 2 minutes. Add tomatoes, milk, corn, parsley, and basil. Bring to a boil and add halibut, stir gently so as not to break up fish. Add cheese just before serving.

This wonderfully comforting dessert would make a nice finish to a dinner of Halibut Chowder and crusty bread. As a matter of fact, this dessert would make a nice dinner! It is all the things we love in a candy bar -peanut butter, chocolate and cashews. Renetta Westgard served it for ladies aid this month and am I ever glad I went.

PEANUT BUTTER PUDDING DESSERT

1 cup all-purpose flour

1/2 cup cold butter, cubed

1-1/2 cups chopped cashews, *divided*

1 package (8 ounces) Cream Cheese, softened

1/3 cup creamy peanut butter

1 cup confectioners' sugar

1 carton (12 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed, *divided*

2-2/3 cups cold milk

1 package (3.9 ounces) instant chocolate pudding mix

1 package (3.4 ounces) instant vanilla pudding mix

1 milk chocolate candy bar (1.55 ounces), coarsely chopped

Directions

Place flour and butter in a food processor; cover and process until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add 1 cup cashews; pulse a few times until combined. Press into a greased 13-in. x 9-in. baking dish. Bake at 350° for 25-28 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely on a wire rack. In a small bowl, beat the cream cheese, peanut butter and confectioners' sugar until smooth. Fold in 1 cup whipped topping. Spoon over crust.

In another bowl, whisk milk and both pudding mixes for 2 minutes. Let stand for 2 minutes or until soft-set. Spread over cream cheese layer. Top with remaining whipped topping. Sprinkle with chopped candy bar and remaining cashews. Cover and refrigerate for at least 1 hour before serving. **Yield:** 12-16 servings




