Val's Recipe Corner

Aaaaaaaah! Tell me it isn't so-the Fourth of July has come and gone and we know what that means. The downhill side of summer and I swear, if I listen real close, I can hear every verse of "Crazy" still bouncing off the hills on Highway 5 and just when the images of "Road Closed" had finally begun to fade from my mind. Why is it? Winters last forever and summer is gone before we know it. Could it be "state of mind"? Whatever it is- enough of that, I'll enjoy what's left of summer and try not to think about what "old man winter" may be conjuring up for us in the months to come.

I recently had the most enjoyable "stop and smell the roses" day and didn't travel but a few miles. I love a picnic and for my 50th birthday I received a beautiful picnic basket from a group of friends. I try to get in at least a couple picnics a summer, but even that can prove to be a challenge with everyone's schedules. I made up my mind this season I was going to visit the Alkabo School and picnic at Writing Rock Park if it was the last thing I did. I have been meaning to get there for years and, well, you know how it goes? Anything in your back yard is the last thing you get to. I was on a mission. I've found the best way to plan a picnic is by the weather, which means spur of the moment. If I try to plan ahead the weather never cooperates, so a day or two in advance works best. I checked with the weather man, made the calls and we were on our way. The day was gorgeous-75, overcast, and still. The previous day was 92 and windy, and the following day, windy and rainy so we lucked out. We arrived at the Writing Rock exhibit and once again were in awe of its age and what it represents. Very impressive, and to think it has stood the test of time in little Alkabo, North Dakota. After viewing the rock and studying the accompanying literature, we turned and stood on the hill once again in awe of the beautiful little gemstone of a park tucked in the hills. It is immaculate. Puts our community to shame. Grass cut, weeds trimmed and sprayed, shelters clean and bug free.

We ventured down and all took turns riding on the swings and merry-go-round before we spread our bounty on the nice, sturdy picnic tables. We finished our lunch and ventured to the edge of the clearing to take in the beautiful view to the north, which seemed to reach Canada. Among the prairie grass we spotted wildflowers, "pretty rocks" and a new species of bugs. When we finished exploring it was time to pack up and head to Alkabo to tour the school. Another gem in the wild. Thanks to Elaine and George Leiningner and Rob Rust, the whole town is mowed and neat as a pin. The school looks like any other in June. Just resting, waiting for classes to resume in the fall. If the walls could talk and fill in the blanks, the stories we have conjured up from the bits and pieces of history left behind would be complete. It is not to be taken lightly, the love and dedication it has taken to maintain this structure for 40 years. Despite the fact I have no ties whatsoever to the community of Alkabo, I feel much gratitude and indebtedness to those in that community who have worked together to preserve the history of their town for the rest of us to enjoy and in the most fitting way- through the doors of the school house, the core of every little community. It was a great day!

I decided it fitting to share my Writing Rock picnic menu today and have compiled a list of items needed to pull off the best of picnics with the least surprises.

There are many picnic baskets available out there, but they certainly aren't necessary for a successful picnic. The convenience of having your basic utensils packed and ready to go may be worth the investment, though, and make the possibility of a repeat performance more of a reality. The basket generally comes with a service for four including plates, silverware, glasses and some may include napkins, salt & pepper shakers, cork screw and paring knife. I find all of these things essential for any picnic. If you are compiling your own basket, I would consider all of these items. If you chose to go with disposable table settings, be sure to include enough garbage bags to properly dispose of these items. Other convenient items, which may be added, include: roll of paper towels, wipes, insect repellent, sun block, blanket and or table cloth (I would recommend two or one of each), extra ziplocks for leftovers or dirty silverware etc, and depending on your destination, you may wish to include a roll of toilet paper.

One thing nice, once you have these things assembled, they can be stored together for the picnic season and all that you have to think about is the food and beverages.

As far as the beverages go, pack a variety and include plenty of water. Of course, my audience (myself included), prefers wine with our picnic lunch so throw a bottle in the cooler with the rest of the beverages. There are now insulated beverage coolers available that hold six cans or bottles that work well if you are not traveling too far and are easy to carry. As with anything you are hosting, pack your beverages according to your guest's preferences. Thermoses' of ice tea, lemonade or coffee may be more to the liking than bottled pop or water.

Now, on to the food. One thing nice about a picnic, the beauty of the surrounding, the fresh air, and the gathering of friends makes anything you choose taste good. A baguette, some fruit, a chunk of cheese and don't forget the wine, you have the makings for a perfect picnic. For a brunch picnic you may include boiled eggs, muffins, caramel rolls, fruit, and cheese. The simplicity of it suits the picnic idea to a tee. A sandwich on hearty bread with a few chips and a brownie would please many. The traditional picnic fare of fried chicken and potato salad is always a hit, but takes a little more thought and preparation to keep things properly cooled and transported. As I mentioned, the food is really the simple part, because anything will be enjoyed and appreciated in the surroundings of friends and Mother Nature.

Here are the recipes for my picnic spread.

SWEET PEAR AND GORGONZOLA SALAD

- 1 T butter
- 2 Anjou pears, cored and each cut into 12 slices
- 1 T Dijon mustard
- ¼ cup fresh lemon juice
- 2 T maple syrup
- ¼ cup extra virgin olive oil
- ½ t salt
- 1/8 t fresh-ground pepper
- 6 ounces arugula
- 1 head romaine lettuce, washed, trimmed, and cut
- 1 ounce blue cheese, crumbled (about ¼ cup)
- ½ cup chopped pecans
- 1 small red onion, thinly sliced

Melt the butter over medium heat in a large nonstick skillet.

Add the pear slices and cook until the pears are golden but still slightly firm to the touch-about 6 minutes. Set aside. Combine the mustard, lemon juice, and maple syrup in a small bowl, slowly whisk in the olive oil. Season with the salt and pepper. Toss the arugula, romaine, blue cheese, pecans, onion, and prepared pears together with the dressing in a large bowl. Serve immediately. Serves 6.

Note: For the picnic, I used 3 -4 cup disposable plastic containers for each salad. I layered the salad ingredients and added cooked chicken breast. Mix the dressing ingredients in a small jar and put in picnic basket. Pass dressing at serving time.

PHYLLO PIZZA WITH FETA, BASIL AND TOMATOES

- ½ cup shredded mozzarella
- ½ cup finely crumbles feta
- ¼ cup grated fresh Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese
- 1 T chopped fresh oregano
- ¼ t salt 1/8 t freshly ground pepper
- 10 (18x14inch) sheets frozen phyllo dough, thawed
- Cooking spray
- 2 cups thinly sliced plum tomatoes
- 1/3 cup thinly sliced green onions
- ¼ cup fresh basil leaves

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Combine first 6 ingredients in a bowl. Cut phyllo sheets in half crossways. Working with 1 phyllo sheet half at a time (covering remaining dough to keep from drying), place phyllo sheet on a baking sheet coated with baking spray. Coat phyllo sheet with cooking spray. Repeat with 2 more layers of phyllo. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons cheese mixture. Repeat layers 5 times, ending with 2 phyllo sheets. Coat top phyllo sheet with cooking spray; sprinkle with 2 Tablespoons cheese mixture. Pat tomato slices with a paper towel. Arrange tomato slices on top of cheese, leaving a 1 inch border. Sprinkle with onions and remaining 6 tablespoons cheese mixture. Bake for 20 minutes or until golden. Sprinkle with basil leaves. 6 servings.

For the picnic, I baked the phyllo pizza right before we left, sliced, placed on a plate and covered with foil.

I completed the picnic lunch with rice krispie bars. IT'S NEVER TOO LATE TO STOP AND SMELL THE ROSES-

School Board Meeting Minutes

Regular Meeting
June 10, 2009
7:00 P.M.

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Westby School District #3 was held on June 10, 2009. Brenda Ryals, Donna Sorenson, Jim Sundsted, Marty Westgard, Vance Meyer, Mr. Koterba and Arlene Hove were in attendance. Chairman Ryals called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Visitor at this meeting was Jennifer Pulvermacher.

The tentative agenda was reviewed; two announcement items were added, followed by a motion to approve by Sorenson, seconded by Meyer, AIF.

Arlene read the minutes of the May 12, 2009 regular meeting. Sorenson noted a clarification of New Business item H. Track Coach Sue Meyer would like 4-5 lanes installed just south of the school on the playground rather than repair the existing track at the old football field. Following this clarification the minutes were approved and placed on file.

The April financial and investment interest reports were reviewed.

Public Comment None

Committee Reports: Buildings and Grounds

A. The meeting with the engineer, Lon Drevecky of Prairie Engineering, has taken place. Mr. Koterba reported that split/resistance heating and air conditioning units are Mr. Drevecky's recommendation. Meyer moved to accept Prairie Engineering's proposals and to authorize purchase of the materials as necessary. This motion for equipment purchase was seconded by Westgard, AIF. Mr. Koterba stated that other summer maintenance projects are moving along, including the tile removal in the kitchen. Mike Gebhardt, Custodian, will cut out the bad spots in the asphalt surrounding the school and the County will fill in with new asphalt. An asbestos removal bid calling for removal of asbestos in the wall between the girl's and boy's locker rooms has been received from Safetech of Billings. The bid was for \$3,707.00.

Negotiations:

Several extracurricular contracts have either been not returned, returned unsigned, or have not been issued. Shari Olson has requested a \$400 raise on the Annual Adviser stipend, stating that there were just two students assisting with the annual this year, thus requiring her to do much of the work. Following discussion and being that stipend has not been raised in over 10 years, Meyer moved to grant Mrs. Olson a \$250 raise as Annual Adviser, motion seconded by Sundsted, AIF. Sorenson moved to issue extracurricular contracts to Josh Marottek for Head Boys' Basketball Coach with an increase to \$2400 to keep in line with what Grenora pays a head coach; Joe Eberle for Assistant Boys' Basketball Coach with an increase to \$1500, also what Grenora pays; Chad Solberg for Grade 3-6 Girls' and Boys' Basketball Coach. Sundsted seconded the motion for these coaching contracts, AIF. Since there is no one interested in the Girls' or Boys' 7th & 8th grade basketball coaching positions, these will be advertised.



Another area of concern was that the school play be scheduled at least three weeks ahead of this years' scheduled in order to avoid other spring activities and athletics.

Unfinished Business:

A. Regarding classes to be excluded from GPA, Meyer moved to exclude music, journalism and P.E. classes when figuring a student's GPA, motion seconded by Westgard, AIF.

B. Jennifer Pulvermacher presented Student Absentee Policies from 6 area schools. Following review and discussion, Mr. Koterba will work up a sample policy for Westby School, to be reviewed at the August meeting.

New Business:

A. Due to the fact that there will be no July School Board meeting, Sorenson moved to authorize the Clerk to pay July's accounts payable items, Sundsted seconded the motion, AIF.

B. Mr. Koterba recommended the following fund transfers: \$700,000.00 from the Building Reserve Fund to the Flexibility Fund; \$200,000.00 from the Building Reserve Fund to the Technology Fund. Sorenson moved to approve these fund transfers, Meyer seconded, AIF.

Announcements/Discussion

A. Mr. Koterba will attend the Country Transportation Meeting on June 16, 2009.

B. Mr. Koterba reviewed with the Board the 2008/09 Bus Maintenance Report

C. The September Board meeting will be rescheduled to September 22, 2009.

D. Jim Sundsted inquired about the possibility of setting up a scholarship fund. Mr. Koterba and Arlene explained that District monies cannot be used to provide student scholarships. An Endowment Fund would need to be established, with monies given by individuals or businesses.

E. Ryals read a Thank You from Peggy Bowman.

Meyer moved to approve payment of June payroll warrants #10414-10423 totaling \$28,711.57, and June claims warrants #15110-15156 totaling \$28,711.57. Sundsted seconded the motion for payment approval, AIF.

The May extracurricular financial report was reviewed followed by a motion by Sorenson to approve, motion seconded by Westgard, AIF.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:14 p.m.

The Re-organizational Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Westby School District #3 was held on June 10, 2009 at 8:15 p.m. Members of the Board in attendance were Marty Westgard, Brenda Ryals, Donna Sorenson, Vance Meyer and Jim Sundsted, as well as Mr. Koterba and Arlene Hove.

The first call for nominations for Chairman resulted in Sorenson nominating Ryals. The second and third calls for nominations yielded no further nominations. Meyer seconded the motion of nomination for Ryals. All voted in favor of Brenda Ryals for Chairman.
