

Just when we needed it most, Pastor Mark Hall who served our parish several years ago wrote a letter of encouragement with enthusiastic words and a passion for the project (as well as a donation) that the committee rereads and rereads to help get us through the day to day obstacles we encounter. He told us we were doing the right thing by thinking of others (handicapped) and it was OK to pursue, and plan, and forge ahead and we needed to hear that.

As in most areas of our life, we take it for granted our family will be there when we need them most for support and encouragement; likewise, as in this case, we expect the church family to give and support the project, after all, it *is* their project, but it is when the unexpected shows up in your mail, at your meeting, or in a bank envelope, it becomes a real eye opener and humbling; to say the least.... Summer is here in all its glory with the thermometer hovering in the 90's and a chance of thunderstorms daily. The recipes this week keep this in mind: refreshing and easy with a satisfying bite.

### CREAMY COCONUT RUM CAKE

1 box white cake mix + ingredients on box  
1/4 cup Coconut Rum  
2 1/2 cups coconut flakes, divided  
1 can sweetened condensed milk  
1 can (14oz) Coco Lopez Cream of Coconut  
1 tub (8oz) Cool Whip  
Mix cake as directed on box, substituting 1/4 cup of water called for with the Coconut Rum. Mix 1/2 cup of coconut flakes into batter. Pour into greased 13x9 baking pan. Bake according to directions on cake mix box. While cake is still hot, use fork to poke holes in top of cake. Mix together the sweetened condensed milk and Cream of coconut. *Please Note: Cream of Coconut is usually found in the mixed drink aisle. It is NOT the same as Coconut Milk!* Pour mixture over top of hot cake. Allow cake to cool long enough for the mixture to soak in completely. Top cake with thawed cool whip and sprinkle with remaining 2 cups coconut.

Note: I sprinkled 2 cups of chopped fresh strawberries over coconut milk once it had cooled (Reminiscent of Tres Leches or 3 milk cake) and topped with whipped cream and coconut rather than cool whip. Awesome! If you prefer not to use Coconut Rum, add a tsp of coconut extract to cake batter.

## Annual Drinking Water Quality Report

We're very pleased to provide you with the Annual Water Quality Report. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. Our source of water is classified as groundwater, and comes from 2 wells. We have completed a source water protection plan that provides more information about potential sources of contamination to our drinking water supply. This plan can be found online at <http://nris.state.mt.us/wis/swap/swapquery.asp>.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present include:

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife;

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming;

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses;

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems;

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

We're pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and meets federal and state requirements.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water, please contact **Lynden Lagerquist** at **385-2445**. If you want to learn more about our water, you can attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held on the **second Monday of each month at 7:30 pm at the Town Hall**.

Westby routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The following table shows the results of any detects in our monitoring for the period of **January 1<sup>st</sup> to December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2011**. For constituents that are not monitored yearly, we have reviewed our records back the last 5 years.

Westby has been issued a waiver for certain inorganic contaminants. This waiver allows our water system to sample only once every 9 years for these regulated contaminants: barium, cadmium, chromium,

mercury, selenium, fluoride. Past sampling for these contaminants has shown that they are not present in our water supply, or occur in such small amounts that they are not considered a health hazard. This waiver is in effect from 2002 through 2011.

We have monitored for lead and copper, and all of our samples have been in compliance with the Lead and Copper Rule. If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Westby is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. In the tables above and below you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

*Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/L)* - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

*Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (ug/L)* - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000

*Action Level* - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

*Treatment Technique (TT)* - (mandatory language) A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

*Maximum Contaminant Level* - (mandatory language) The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

*Maximum Contaminant Level Goal* - (mandatory language) The "Goal"(MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

*Picocuries per liter (pCi/L)* - picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

We ask that all our customers help us protect our water sources, which are the heart of our community, our way of life and our children's future.

**Our system had one violation repeated several times.** Our new well exceeds the allowed level of arsenic in drinking water. We sample the well quarterly, and each quarter we are cited for exceeding the allowed level of arsenic in water.

Some people who drink water containing arsenic in excess of the MCL over many years could experience skin damage or problems with their circulatory system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

We're proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all other Federal and State requirements. We have learned through our monitoring and testing that some constituents have been detected. The EPA has determined that your water **IS SAFE** at these levels.



Secretary Val Moore called the meeting to order at 6:00 with board members Nate Olson, and Jody Lagerquist present. Kolby Ruggles and Cindy Stenhjem arrived at 6:30. Leann Westgard and Brenda Ryals arrived at 6:40. The May minutes were read and placed on file. The May financial report was presented: previous balance \$10, 371.79. One new bill, \$35.00 to Sheriff's Department for liquor license for Prairie Fest was presented. Kolby motioned to pay, 2<sup>nd</sup> Jody AIF. New balance \$10, 326.79. Border News account balance \$2851.77. Paid out \$300.00 to Tracy and Val and \$260.00 to postmaster for stamps. Received in \$1014.00 for subscriptions and ads for a new balance of \$3305.77.

### **Old Business:**

#### **MUSEUM:**

Jody reported the old Wirtzburger house will no longer be feasible for the museum. Besides the water issue, making it handicap accessible and rethinking the size-whether adequate or not-it just doesn't pencil out. The grant monies received from the Sheridan County Foundation will be returned.

## CHOCOLATE PEANUT BUTTER PRETZEL BITES

These bars are easy enough for the kids to make and won't heat up the kitchen even a little bit.

### AVALANCHE BARS

12 oz bag of White Chocolate Chips  
1/4 cup creamy peanut butter  
3 cups Rice Krispies  
1 1/2 cups mini marshmallows  
1/4 cup mini chocolate chips + 2 Tbsp for garnish.  
Lightly grease a 9x9 pan. In microwave-safe bowl pour in white chips and heat on 50% power for 1 minute. Stir and continue in 30 second increments until chips are melted. Pour mixture into the prepared pan and spread evenly, pressing lightly with the back of your spoon, but do not compact too much, otherwise they will get hard. Press the remaining chocolate chips into the top for garnish. When the bars are completely cooled cut into squares and enjoy.  
Another super easy treat for kids and grown-up alike and they don't have to be refrigerated.

1 cup creamy peanut butter  
2 tablespoons butter, softened  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar  
48 Pretzel Crisps® Original Pretzels  
10 oz semi-sweet chocolate, chopped  
fleur de sol (artisan salt), to taste  
In a stand mixer, combine peanut butter, butter, brown sugar, and powdered sugar -till well combined.  
Roll peanut butter mixture in 1 inch balls and smash in-between two pretzels.  
In a medium bowl, microwave semi-sweet chocolate in 15 second increments, until melted.

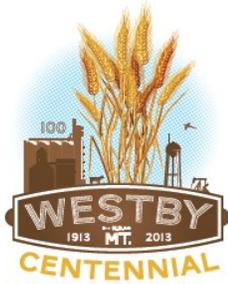
