



MING QUALIFIES FOR NATIONALS



Mother's Day conjures up images that bring all the senses into play. The picture perfect world of Harriet Nelson where the smell of a fresh baked cookie awaits you and that gooey cookie combined with a glass of milk can solve most any problem. A kiss can take the sting out of any hurt and Mom, and only Mom, really knows what's best. No matter the reality of your situation, these images bring a smile to your face.

I salute my Mother this Mother's Day. It doesn't seem to matter how old you are, there are still some things (probably many things) Moms have the answers to. She raised us during a time when phrases like "working mom", "single mom", or "one parent families" hadn't yet been coined. She did it with nary a complaint. She also managed to do it without making us feel different, unloved, or like we didn't have anything which I'm quite sure, for a time, we didn't. The story had a fairy tale ending, but the strength Mom exhibited during those though times will never be forgotten. Thanks, Mom, you didn't think I noticed.

In my Harriet Nelson world, I was thinking of having Mom over for a "spot" of tea and a scone this Mother's Day. Can you just see it? Mom and I are sitting on the patio in our big wide brim hats, a hanky daintily held in one hand, possibly blowing in the breeze, and an umbrella in the other, shielding our delicate creamy complexion from even a hint of sun, sipping our tea and nibbling on a scone. You do have it pictured, don't you? A big gust of wind has the hat blown to the pasture east of the house, the hanky is-oh, lose the hanky! and when was the last time anyone needed an umbrella around here for anything? We have our parkas on and the only reason we are drinking tea is to stay warm, but my, the scones are warm and sweet and wonderful just like "Mom".

While this picture may not have been exactly what the British had in mind when they made scones a staple of the afternoon tea course, scones have developed fans worldwide to be enjoyed most anytime. Their biscuit-like texture make them an option for breakfast, brunch, and of course, tea. Both sweet and savory, scones fall into two basic categories: cream scones and biscuit scones. Cream scones use cream as their source of fat; the richer the cream, the richer the scone. Biscuit scones use cold butter cut into the dough to keep them flaky. The following recipes are an example of each. The first one comes from Karen Meyer. It is a delicious cream scone made with dried fruit. The next recipe is an example of a biscuit scone. These scones are made with frozen berries and formed by dropping rather than cutting into the traditional wedges. Both are exceptional.

ORANGE CRANBERRY SCONES

4 cups plus $\frac{1}{4}$ cup flour
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup sugar
 2 T baking powder
 2 t kosher salt
 1 T grated orange zest
 $\frac{3}{4}$ pound butter, diced
 4 extra large eggs, lightly beaten
 1 cup cold heavy cream
 1 cup dried cranberries
 1 egg beaten combined w/ 2 T water
 Granulated sugar
 4 t orange juice mixed w/ $\frac{1}{2}$ cup powdered sugar
 Preheat oven to 400degrees. Mix 4 cups flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and zest. Add cold butter & mix until size of peas. Combine eggs & cream with mixer on low and slowly add flour mixture. Dough will be lumpy. Combine cranberries and remaining $\frac{1}{4}$ cup flour, add to dough. Knead into a ball. Divide dough in half. Pat dough into 8" circles on baking sheet and cut into 12 wedges. Brush with egg wash and sprinkle w/ sugar. Bake 20-25 min. Cool. Drizzle w/ OJ glaze

CORNMEAL-BLUEBERRY SCONES

1- 1/3 cups flour
 2/3 cup yellow cornmeal
 2 Tbsp sugar
 2 Tbsp brown sugar
 1 ½ t baking powder
 1/3 cup cold butter, cut up
 ½ cup buttermilk
 1 egg
 1 ½ t finely shredded lime peel
 1 cup frozen blueberries (leave frozen until ready to toss with cornstarch)
 1 t cornstarch
 3-4 t lime juice
 1 cup powdered sugar
 3 Tbsp chopped almonds, toasted

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Coat a large baking sheet with cooking spray. In a large bowl combine flour, cornmeal, sugars, baking powder, baking soda and ½ t salt. Cut in butter until flour mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Make well in center. Combine buttermilk, egg and lime peel; add all at once to flour mixture. Stir with fork just until moistened. Toss berries with cornstarch to coat; add to flour mixture. Stir gently 3-5 turns, just until berries are incorporated (do not overmix). Using a large spoon, drop dough into 12 mounds on baking sheet. Bake 12-15 minutes or until tops are golden. For icing, in a small bowl whisk enough lime juice into powdered sugar until drizzling consistency. Drizzle over warm scones. Sprinkle with nuts. Serve warm. Makes 12 scones.

WDC Meeting Minutes

The regular meeting of the Westby Development Corporation was held April 21, 2008 at the Westby Community Center with four members present. Al Joyes, Val Moore, Kolby Ruggles and Brenda Ryals. The meeting was called to order at 7:40 p.m. by President Al Joyes.

The secretary's minutes were read with no corrections or additions noted and were placed on file.

The treasurer's report was given as follows:

The WDC account had a previous balance of \$5985.63 with the following bills being paid: \$5.00 to the city for sewer for Simpson house and \$5.00 to NCA for mouse poison for Simpson house. The account received \$2.48 in interest and \$10.00 in membership fees, and has a new balance of \$5988.11

New bills for this month are as follows:

City of Westby for sewer on Simpson house \$5.00. Val made a motion to pay the bill, seconded by Kolby, all were in favor.

The WDC savings has a balance of \$514.43, and the CD has a balance of \$13725.31.

The Border News account has a previous balance of \$1710.47 with the following bills being paid: Val Moore \$100.00, Tracy Johanson \$75.00, Postmaster \$164.00 (4 rolls of stamps), and \$3.70 to the bank for a service charge. TERMINAL PROGRESS

There is bird's eye view from atop the giant crane moved onto New Century Ag terminal site a few weeks ago. See for yourself. Below is a picture taken of the top of the slip deck from the crane's man-basket 80 feet in the air. The slip deck is the area from which all of the concrete will be poured into the forms, wheel barrow by wheel barrow. Each round form represents a 34 foot tank, the end large square tanks are the bulk weigh system and the smaller square tanks are 6 finish cleaning bins. Also pictured are the double mud hopper and the pump shed (square wooden building). The pump shed houses the pumps and timers that will operate the hydraulic system that jack this structure into the air. The entire form will inch it's way into the sky all at one time as the pour sets. The continuous pour of slip will use 4210 cubic yds of concrete averaging 30 cubic yds a foot. The combined facility contains over one million pounds of rebar and over a ton of nails was used to put the wooden slip forms together.

The final decision will be made the beginning of next week in regards to the start date for pouring the slip, when a site visit will be made from Vigen Construction's main office. The tentative start dates have been set for May 28th or June 2.

At that time, along with the contract labor force of well over a hundred plus the foremen and job "boss", there will be pump truck operators, crane operators, safety managers, owners and engineers as well as more supervision to assure the project is completed as safely as designed.

NOTICE:

For safety reasons, Vigen Construction requests all visitors to check in at the Vigen trailer when entering the job-site. Please do not proceed into the work area unsupervised.

While the slip is poured, Vigen Construction will designate a specific area where vehicles and sightseers will be allowed to watch this huge undertaking in progress.

James L. Christensen, 85, of Westby died Saturday, April 26, 2008 at Sheridan Memorial Hospital. Memorial Services were conducted 10AM Wednesday, April 30, 2008 at Immanuel Lutheran Church with Pastor Barb Westhoff officiating. Burial of cremated remains immediately followed at Emmaus Cemetery.

James was born July 18, 1922 the youngest of five children born to Art & Karen (Christensen) Christensen on a farm near Antelope. He played guitar in his early years, and met his future wife, Elavon Nelson, while playing at a school house dance. They married on April 8, 1944 in Plentywood at Plentywood Lutheran Church. James and Elavon spent their entire lives together on the family farm near Westby.

He worked very hard to build up the farm that he was devoted to and loved. James was a skilled carpenter, constructing many of the farmstead buildings, and later he and Don built Don and Karla's house. James was an accomplished welder and could build anything that farm - life required. James designed and built a truck-mounted bale loader, and he also made sand box back-hoes and can crushers for his grandchildren.

He enjoyed animals of all kinds. He raised cattle, but also had goats, geese, chickens and one pig that reached 760 Lbs!

In his later years he looked forward to the spring arrival of the yellow finches in his backyard, where he also had abundant raspberry and apple crops.

The family dogs became also great companions to him. He spent countless hours doing wordsearch books, and enjoyed hard candy with countless cups of coffee. His hot buttered rums at Christmas were a family favorite.

James served as secretary of the Farmers Elevator Board; treasurer of Emmaus Church Council and a Washington School board member.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his daughter Joanne Field; a brother Chester Christensen, and three sisters, Hilda O'Brien, Mary Carr and Laura Bestland.

James is survived by his wife of 64 years, Elavon Christensen, who resides on the family farm near Westby; his son and daughter-in-law Donald & Karla Christensen of Westby; their children, Branden of Rock Island, IL; Melissa (Carl) Cheetham and their daughter, Bo Cheetham, of Sidney; Bryan Christensen of Moses Lake, Washington. James is also survived by his son, Les Christensen, of Westby; his son-in-law, Ervin Field, of Gladmar, Saskatchewan, Canada; his and Joanne's children, Tara Field of Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada; Justin (Christina) Field of Calgary, Alberta, Canada., along with numerous nieces and nephews.
