The group rehearses in Crosby from early September through the first weekend in December with performers traveling as far as 60 miles to attend the rehearsals.


This year's concert, "Awaken and Prepare Us", is directed by Ed Retzer and Harlan Johnson, both of Crosby.



School Board Meeting Minutes

Regular Meeting
November 14, 2012
7:00 P.M.

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Westby School District 3 was held on November 14, 2012. Brenda Ryals, Vance Meyer, Brant Cartwright, Jim Sundsted, Aldon Joyes, Mr. Holecek, Mr. Somppi and Donna Sorenson were in attendance. Chairman Ryals called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m.

The Chairman recognized the visitors, Jody and Cindy Lagerquist.

Donna read the minutes of the October 8, 2012 meeting. Following no corrections or additions, these minutes were approved and placed on file.

The Board reviewed the Clerk's September financial report.

Public Comment: None

Committee Reports:

Buildings & Grounds: Mr. Holecek informed the Board that a representative from Theil Bros. Roofing will be here for the December -

school board meeting to discuss the repairs that need to be done to the school roof.

Sports Co-op Committee: Mr. Holecek reported that things have been going well overall for the sports co-op. The most difficult thing has been re-scheduling. It is challenging to communicate changes of practices and games to everyone involved in both schools.

Transportation Committee: Mr. Holecek explained the current route and order in which students are picked up and dropped off on the south bus route. Jody and Cindy Lagerquist voiced their concerns about the length of the ride for their students and the inconsistency in order in which students are dropped off in the afternoon. Following discussion, the board decided it would be inappropriate to change a bus route mid-year, (after it has been certified by the county superintendent) but they would request the driver to be more consistent in the order of the route. Mr. Holecek informed the board that there is an on-going problem with the defrost system on the Ranger bus.

School Board Meeting Minutes

Unfinished Business:

A. Mr. Holecek presented information on what other area schools charge for rent and security deposits for district housing. Following discussion, Meyer moved to set the security deposit and rental amount and include a no smoking clause and a no pet clause in the lease agreement for the residence at 209 W 2nd Ave. A rental application process will be established and lease agreements and rent amounts of all school owned properties will be reviewed each year in January. Cartwright seconded the motion; AIF.

New Business:

A. Mr. Holecek informed the board that we should receive renewal rates for health insurance premiums in January. At this time he anticipates that Westby School will be a member of the Co-op again next year. The prescription plan we participate in will be discontinued next year so we will need to find out how the change will affect us.

B. Sundsted made a motion to hire Angel Light Catering to provide the meal for the staff Christmas Party on Dec. 3 and to give a gift certificate to local businesses to each staff member as has been done in the past. Meyer seconded the motion; AIF.

C. Superintendent evaluation forms were distributed to each board member. Mrs. Ryals requested that they be completed and returned to her before Nov. 30. She will meet with Mr. Holecek before the December meeting to discuss any concerns.

D. Mr. Holecek would like to hire a student custodian to assist with after-school janitorial duties while one of the janitors is on extended leave for medical reasons. Cartwright made a motion to hire Marcie Hendrickson for this position, Joyes seconded; AIF.

Announcements/Discussion

Superintendent's Report:

A. Mr. Holecek reported that he is in process of completing non-tenured teacher evaluations.

B. Mr. Holecek has submitted the OPI Fall report.



The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 p.m.



We enjoyed a much needed visit to catch up and had an awesome meal with Shirlee and Lynn with Lynn's ribs smoked to perfection. And, of course, it goes without saying we loved every single minute with the grandkids. We took in "Elmo Live" and The Fresh Beat Band concert with them and saw this world through their big-as-saucers eyes. As much as anything, Ashley, great-grandma and grandma enjoyed their shopping trip with the boys as they tried so hard to narrow down their Christmas wish list from the many, many options luring them in. We were happy Mom and Marlowe made the trip with us and they were able to -

spend time with Jan and Duane, as well. All in all, as the memories begin to return through the fog it is evident a good time was had by all.

And...with Christmas, but a blink away, here are a few recipes that just may come in handy this holiday season.

These muffins are for those who can't decide what's for breakfast or even better, what to have with your Christmas morning coffee-a doughnut or muffin.

GLAZED DOUGHNUT MUFFINS

- ½ cup butter
- ¼ cup vegetable oil
- ½ cup sugar
- 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 1 ½ tsp baking powder
- ¼ tsp baking soda
- ¾ tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- ¾ tsp salt
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 2/3 cups flour

1 cup milk

GLAZE

- 3 tbsps butter, melted
- 1 cup confectioner sugar, sifted
- ¾ tsp vanilla
- 2 tbsp hot water

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Line 12 muffin cups with liners. In a large bowl beat butter, oil, and sugars until smooth. On low speed beat in eggs, one at a time; add vanilla and beat until incorporated. Reduce the mixer to low speed and add baking powder, soda, nutmeg, cinnamon, and salt and mix just until combined. With a spoon stir the flour alternately with the milk into the batter, beginning and ending with flour and mixing just until incorporated. Do not over mix. Divide batter among cups, smoothing tops. Bake until muffin tops are a pale golden and springy to the touch, 15-17 minutes, rotating halfway through baking time.

Cool muffins in tins for 5 minutes, transfer to wire racks and cool 10 minutes before glazing.

In a medium bowl, mix the glaze ingredients and whisk until smooth. When muffins have cooked slightly, dip the muffin crown in to the glaze and allow the glaze to set. Once set, dip a second time and allow glaze to set. Serve.

These little candy bites are so cute when you use shaped ice cube trays or candy molds. Little star or tree shaped ice cube trays are inexpensive and easy to come by this time of year. Mix it up a little bit and substitute chocolate bark and almonds. Whatever your favorite candy or cookie additions may be, will work.

BITE-SIZE PARTY BARK

½ package of almond bark
2 tbsp chopped peanuts
2 tbsp heath toffee chips
2 tbsp mini chocolate chips
2 tbsp Craisins

Stir all your add-ins together in a small bowl. Place almond bark in a microwave safe bowl. Melt almond bark slowly, starting with a minute. Stir and microwave 10 seconds at a time until melted being careful not to overheat. Spoon almond bark in to the tray (or for an easier method, place melted bark in one of those purchased ketchup or mustard bottles and squirt it in the cubes). Fill trays less than half full to allow space for add-ins to stick into and make sure they stick together, but still visible. Allow the bites to cool and harden. Pop out of the trays. Makes 2 trays or 28 pieces. These pretty little bites will make great little teacher or hostess gifts when you arrange them on a Christmas plate and tie them up with a holiday bow.

Here is another holiday recipe, pretty as it is tasty. The recipe makes a cookie sheet or 32 bars, plenty for sharing.

PEPPERMINT SUGAR COOKIE BARS

1 cup butter, room temperature
2 cups sugar
4 large eggs
2 tsp vanilla
5 cups flour
1 tsp salt
½ tsp baking soda
1 cup crushed after dinner butter mints
FROSTING

1 cup butter, room temperature
½ tsp peppermint extract
Pinch of salt
4 cups confectioner's sugar
2-4 tbsp milk
Food coloring, if desired
½ cup crushed candy canes
Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease a large 11X17 inch rimmed baking sheet. Line with parchment paper and grease paper as well; set aside. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, salt, and baking soda. In a mixing bowl beat butter and sugar and light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing after each addition. Add in vanilla. Add in flour mixture, mixing just until combined. Stir in butter mints. Spread batter evenly onto prepared baking sheet, smoothing top. Bake until light golden brown and a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, about 20-25 minutes. Transfer to wire rack to cool completely. While cookie is cooling, make frosting in the bowl of an electric mixer, beat butter until fluffy about 3 minutes. Add peppermint extract and salt. Add sugar, a little at a time. Beating until well combined. Add milk, a tablespoon at a time, until frosting is smooth and fluffy. Add a few drops of food coloring if desired. Spread frosting over cooked cookie, sprinkle with crushed peppermints, cut into bars.




When Perry was born, his parents abandoned him, leaving him to be raised by his grandparents. His brothers distance their relationship with him by calling him their "cousin-brother."

Because Perry is “suggestible” and does whatever people ask him to do, Gram helps Perry make a list of people he can trust. Police top the list. Gram comes in second. Number three on his list is Perry’s boss Gary. Gram teaches Perry to learn a word a day from the dictionary and to deposit half his paycheck into his checking account and the other half into his savings account. Every week, Gram instructs Perry to buy five lotto tickets. Long after Gram is dead, Perry continues to do what she told him because Gram is number two on his list.

Author Wood has developed a rich character-driven plot in the telling of this story through Perry’s voice. Perry is likeable, believable and quirky, all characteristics that make him interesting. Long after Gram is dead and Perry has won his \$12 million dollars, just when we think we have Perry figured out, Wood throws in a plot twist that shows us a new side of Perry. A Perry who stops relying on others. A Perry who himself now tops his list of trustworthy people.





Larry Sapp, 80 died Thursday, November 15, 2012 at the Northern Montana Hospital of natural causes. Viewing will be Friday, from 7 – 9 p.m. at the Holland & Bonine Funeral Home. His memorial service will be 10 a.m. Monday, November 19, 2012 at the St. Jude Catholic Church. A fellowship luncheon will be held at the Eagles immediately after the service. Memorial contributions in Larry's honor may be made to the Eagles Aerie of Havre. Services and arrangements have been entrusted to Holland & Bonine Funeral Home.

Larry was born August 27, 1932 to Edward and Margaret (Fahey) Sapp. His family farmed out of Gildford and North Havre and later moved into Havre. Larry continued school in Havre at Havre Central and graduated from Havre High School. He then completed 2 years of college at Northern Montana College on a basketball scholarship studying Business Administration. He then went to Gonzaga University on a basketball scholarship but had his college career cut short due to a serious car accident. In early adulthood, Larry worked at Buttery's Department Store, the Department of Revenue, was a fireman, sold insurance and was a realtor. He spent most of his career as a banker which was the most fulfilling to him. He married Marjorie Ward on June 26, 1953 in Westby, Montana. Together they made their home in Havre, Montana and began their family. Larry loved sports and enjoyed basketball, baseball, softball, bowling, golf and football as well as fishing and hunting.

He was an active member in many organizations which included ROTC, Eagles, Elks, Optimist Club, Toastmasters, Red Cross, Big Sky Girl Scouts, Rotary Club, and the Blue Pony Booster Club. Larry was the youngest of a large family of seven sisters, and three brothers. He was proud of his nine grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren. He was affectionately known as Poppy and would often be seen holding young babies on his chest sound asleep. Retirement allowed Larry to enjoy more Bowling, Golf, fishing and coffee with his friends.
