WESTBY ART STUDENTS CREATE MURAL

The basement halls of Sheridan Memorial Hospital in Plentywood will be brighter thanks to Westby's art teacher, Nate Olson, and his high school students.

While hospital and nursing home patients reside on the main floor of the hospital, the business offices and all other departments are located in the basement. As much as can be done to make for a cheery atmosphere has been done to the offices and work

space, but the hallway is lacking and offers up only a starkness of fluorescent lights and brilliant white walls in an attempt to feign off the dreariness of a basement. Sheridan Memorial Hospital's Safety and Risk Management Director Debbi Somppi was dreaming of a way to, not only make for a more cheerful environment for the hospital employees, but also for the many patients who utilize Sheridan Memorial Urgent Care Clinic, the beautiful new rehab center, the home health department, the lab and the many other departments that it takes to run a successful hospital. Beyond that, many community members use the indoor walking track (hallway) established there several years ago. She envisioned a way to distract from the unsightly pipes that adorn the walls and ceilings of the seven decade old hallway might be with colorful murals. Debbi's pursuit to bring this vision to life began with contacting the art departments in the three schools in the county.

Somppi said, "I can't thank Nate and the students enough. What a great addition the mural is to our facility and the employees have been so excited just watching the project unfold. I know the community will be equally as thrilled with the new art work."

This is not the first mural for these students and we hope it won't be the last. Two small murals have been completed in Mr. Olson's classroom by this group. Hallie Westgard who is in her fourth year of high school art stated "I like to do murals because it is a completely different medium to work on." The Westby Development Corporation has also asked the group to redo the mural on Main Street in Westby which was done by Scott Mangel several years ago for a statewide competition for drug awareness. As soon as the weather cooperates in the spring, Mr. Olson and his students hope to tackle that project.

Hattie Big Sky

“Being of sound mind, I do hereby leave to Hattie Inez Brooks my claim and the house and its contents, as well as one steadfast horse named Plug and a contemptible cow known as Violet. Signed, Chester Hubert Wright, Uncle to Hattie Inez Brooks. P.S. Hattie - bring warm clothes and a cat.”

Thus begins the saga of Hattie Big Sky. It's December 1917 and American involvement in WWI is in full swing. We learn in the opening pages that Hattie, the orphan, is a mere 16 years old, living rather unhappily with her persnickety, unloving Aunt Ivy (“with a voice that could shatter glass”) and Uncle Holt in Arlington, Iowa. Hattie's friend Charlie Hawley (“In all my sixteen years, one of the nicest things to happen to me”) has just left for England and France to fight the Kaiser, when she receives the letter from her Uncle Chester, sent by neighbor Perilee Mueller after Chester “passed”. Hattie didn't even know she had an Uncle Chester and now learns that she is the sole benefactor of 320 Montana acres! There's only one problem - Chester hadn't had time to “prove up” on his claim and Hattie has just one year to do it.

Well it didn't take young Hattie long to decide what to do - there was just one thing to do in her mind and that was to accept the offer and move immediately to Vida, Montana. Having been shuffled from place to place most of her young life, she always felt like “Hattie Here-and-There”. But now her life seemed to have meaning and purpose - and a home of her own - it all seemed too good to be true! Little did she know the hardships and joys that awaited her on the Montana prairie.

Author Kirby Larson draws on her family history and the sights, sounds, and scents of homesteading life. Larson's own great grandmother homesteaded alone in Montana. The author created a host of loving and believable characters, my personal favorite being Hattie's best friend and neighbor Perilee Mueller. She's down home and comfy and says things like, “Sugar, you are a stitch”. We liked the way the author begins each chapter with Hattie's writings, either to Charlie, Uncle Holt or the Honyocker's Homily in the Arlington, Iowa News (for which Hattie gets paid handsomely). This book is great reading for everyone from 12 to 92, a very quick, easy and refreshing read indeed.

Memorial services for Paul "Bud" Nordhagen were held at 2:00 PM Saturday, November 14. Pastors Brandon Smithson and Mike Loken officiated at the service at the Immanuel Lutheran Church in Westby; interment of cremated remains, with military honors, were held in McElroy Cemetery. Bud passed away November 6, 2009 after a long courageous battle with cancer.

Bud was born June 6, 1926 in Westby, Montana. He was one of six children born to Edward and Marie (Gabrielson) Nordhagen. Bud joined the United States Marine Corps on December 22, 1944. During his service to our country his father passed away when Bud was in the service being trained to drive artillery tank. He was released from duty to help farm on October 25, 1945. Once he returned to help with the farm he started dating Marlys Moore. Bud and Marlys were married in the Plentywood Assembly of God church on June 18, 1950 in Westby, MT. To this union were born four children: Susan, Lanny, Dianna and Larry.

Bud worked hard all his life and instilled that work ethic in his family. He made a living doing many things—road excavation, building steel building and grain bins; selling snowmobiles; and to his son's great displeasure had the garbage contact at the Air Force base in Fortuna.

Bud's great love was flying. He received his pilot's license in 1945. He flew his plane until recently. One of Bud's favorite thing to do was to fly over unsuspecting people plowing the field and swoop over their heads. Another thing that Bud loved to do was to take his kid's friends flying and take them for a roller coaster ride until they threw up out the airplane's window—he loved that.

Another favorite pastime of Bud's was fishing. He was always looking for a time when he could get away to fish. Matter of fact, that's how he spent his honey moon with Marlys (she doesn't remember it fondly). He loved taking fishing trips with his sons and his grandchildren. And, if he couldn't go himself, he wanted to hear about it.

Snowmobiling was a major part of Bud's life in the '70's. The whole family loved to snowmobile. Bud and Lanny even raced snowmobiles. For several years Larry lived on a snowmobile. Bud's girls weren't real good on snowmobiles—after running into one another, Bud told them to go home and "suck eggs". When he got home from getting the wounded snowmobiles back, he found Dianna and Susan in the kitchen doing just that, sucking eggs—Bud had to laugh.

Bud also loved time spent with his family and grandchildren sharing his love of flying, fishing and toys with them.

Bud is survived by his daughter Susan Kisler of Phoenix, AZ (children Tiffany, Chase); his son Lanny and wife Kim of Plentywood (children Lindsay, Kelsey, Kale); his daughter Dianna Bussinger and husband Mark of Plentywood (children Tyler, Travis, Kade) and his son Larry and wife Nancy of Shakopee, MN (children Alex, Kate aka Kathy); and former wife Marlys of Plentywood, as well as by four great-grandchildren, Paige, Parker, and Jackson Bussinger and Kya Kisler. He is also survived by two brothers, Milo and James Nordhagen, both of Westby, and by a sister, Mickey Martini, of Glendive. Besides his parents, he was preceded in death by two sisters, Pearl, as a child, and Marion Berezay.

Val's Recipe Corner

Sorry, sorry, sorry. I'm not sure what came over me, but if you haven't noticed, you will if you go to try any of the recipes from the last issue. I missed the measurement for three different ingredients in the two recipes printed. All should have read "cup". A 1/2 cup cold butter in the cheese-cake crust, and 1/2 cup cola and 1/2 cup dried tart cherries in the cake recipe. I sincerely hope this did not cause a problem for anyone. In these instances please feel free to email or call to alert me or question me on the correct amounts. Since we have limited space this issue, I will keep it short and leave it to wishing everyone a perfect Thanksgiving. One full of family and tradition and a moment set aside to realize all we have to be thankful for. For, no matter what, most of us could fill a notebook with the things we have been blessed with. May we take note! The timing for this pie is perfect, what with the holidays upon us, I think you will agree. We gathered to celebrate Mavis's birthday this past weekend and she had a pumpkin and apple pie - ingredients reminiscent of this glorious fall season we've been enjoying – that was a perfect blend of two pie favorites.

PUMPKIN DUTCH APPLE PIE

Apple Layer Ingredients:

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 medium (2 cups) green apples, peeled, cored, thinly sliced
- 2 teaspoons all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 unbaked 9-inch deep-dish pie shell

Pumpkin Layer Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups pure pumpkin
- 1 cup evaporated milk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg

Topping Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/3 cup chopped walnuts
- 5 tablespoons sugar
- 3 tablespoons butter

Heat oven to 375°F. Place 1/4 cup sugar, apples, 2 teaspoons flour, lemon juice and 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon in medium bowl; stir until apples are coated. Pour into pie shell.

Combine pumpkin, evaporated milk, 1/2 cup sugar, eggs, 2 tablespoons butter, 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, salt and nutmeg in medium bowl; pour over apple mixture. Bake for 30 minutes. Meanwhile, combine 1/2 cup all-purpose flour, walnuts and 5 tablespoons sugar in medium bowl; cut in 3 tablespoons butter until crumbly. Remove pie from oven; sprinkle with topping. Continue baking for 20 minutes or until custard is set. Cool completely. Serves 8.

The aromas of the beautiful basted bird have not cleared the air and thoughts have moved on to the next season. With that in mind, I wanted to share this recipe for snowmen cookies Arlene and her granddaughter, Sayler, love to make for the Christmas season.



Arlene, Sayler & the Little Snow People...

LITTLE SNOW PEOPLE

3 1/2 c. all-purpose flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1 c. butter, softened
1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese, softened
2 c. sugar
1 egg
1 tsp. vanilla
1/4 tsp. almond extract
1/4 tsp. coconut flavoring (optional)
Miniature semisweet chocolate chips
Red cinnamon candies or red mini M&M's
3/4 cup sifted powdered sugar
Milk or light cream
Green food coloring
Milk chocolate kisses or mini peanut butter cups, halved
Sifted powdered sugar

In a medium mixing bowl, stir together flour and baking powder. Set aside.

In a large mixer bowl, beat butter and cream cheese with an electric mixer on medium speed for 30 seconds. Add sugar; beat until fluffy. Add egg, vanilla, almond extract, and coconut flavoring; beat well. Gradually add flour mixture to creamed mixture, beating well after each addition. Cover and chill overnight. Or, place in moisture and vapor-proof plastic bags. Seal, label, and freeze up to 3 months. Preheat oven 325 degrees.

For each snowman, shape dough into 3 balls: one 1-inch ball, one 3/4 inch ball, one 1/2 inch ball. Place balls on an ungreased cookie sheet in decreasing sizes with sides touching. Press together slightly. Press 2 chocolate pieces in smallest ball for eyes. Press 1 red cinnamon (or M&M) in middle size ball and 2 candies in largest ball for buttons. Bake 18 minutes or till edges are golden brown. Cool 1 min and carefully transfer to a wire rack. Cool. In small bowl mix 3/4 cup powdered sugar and enough milk to make icing of piping consistency. Stir in green food coloring. To make hats, attach halved milk chocolate kisses or peanut butter cups to the heads with icing. With a decorating bag and writing tip, pipe bow ties, belts, scarves or stocking caps on the snowmen with the remaining icing. Lightly sprinkle with powdered sugar. Makes 4 dozen.

EXTRACURRICULAR BUS DRIVER

Westby School District # 3 is seeking anyone interested in extra-curricular bus driving.

The rate of pay for all day extra-curricular trips will be Nine Dollars (\$9.00) per hour with a guaranteed minimum of seven (7) hours at Seven Dollars (\$7.00) per hour (i.e. - \$49.00). Clock time begins one-half (½) hour prior to leaving and ends one-half (½) hour after unloading passengers. This time is to be used for fueling the bus, cleaning the bus, and getting the bus from and returning it to the garage. It will be necessary for you to keep track of your hours for each trip and come to the office to sign a claim.

The rate of pay for all overnight extra-curricular trips will be Nine Dollars (\$9.00) per hour with a guaranteed minimum of eight (8) hours (includes driving and waiting time). If driving times exceeds eight (8) hours, then drivers will be paid Nine Dollars (\$9.00) per hour for actual driving time. Drivers will be required to keep a log of driving and waiting time. You will be allowed one (1) hour per day cleaning/fueling time to prepare the bus for the following day's travel.

Interested parties will be required to have a valid driver's license and a current Motor Vehicle Report (obtained from the Highway Patrol division of the Montana Department of Justice) with a minimum of 3 years past driving history.





School Board Meeting Minutes

Regular Meeting
November 9, 2009
7:00 P.M.

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Westby School District #3 was held on November 9, 2009. Brenda Ryals, Vance Meyer, Donna Sorenson, Marty Westgard, Mr. Koterba, Mr. Somppi and Arlene Hove were in attendance. Chairman Ryals called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m.

Mr. Koterba noted that a statement regarding public comment is to be read at the beginning of each meeting, as per MSBA policy #1441. Any visitor at a Board meeting may comment on an agenda item during the Public Comment section of the agenda, but **only** during this section.

Visitor at this meeting was Suzi Ekness.

The tentative agenda was reviewed followed by a motion by Sorenson to approve, seconded by Westgard, AIF.

Arlene read the minutes of the October 12, 2009 regular meeting. Following no corrections or additions, these minutes were approved and placed on file.

The August and September Financial Reports, as prepared by Mrs. Hove, were reviewed.

Public Comment Mrs. Ekness inquired of Arlene regarding the Board agenda posting. Arlene explained that the agenda is posted on the library window, usually the Wednesday preceding the Board meeting but always by the Friday prior to Monday's meeting.

Committee Reports: Buildings and Grounds

A. The downstairs heaters are now in good working order. No further word has been received from the engineer regarding the split air conditioning/heating units.

Unfinished Business:

A. The following 3000 series policies were given the second reading:

-Delete – 3210P, 3215, 3221P, 3255P, 3416P, 3422, 3422P, 3530P, 3610; Ryals moved to delete these policies, Sorenson seconded the motion for policy deletion, AIF.

-Revise – 3221, 3226, 3340, 3340P, 3510, 3600P, 3612, 3630; Westgard moved to adopt these revisions, Meyer seconded, AIF.

-New – None

-Optional – 3222, 3235, 3330, 3530, 3535; Sorenson moved to adopt these optional policies, Meyer seconded the motion for policy adoption, AIF.

New Business:

A. The following Series 4000 policies were given a first reading:

-Delete – 4222, 4310P, 4310F, 4616

-Revise – 4210, 4330, 4550

-New – 4210P, 4316, 4330P

-Optional – 4320, 4321, 4410

B. Mr. Koterba passed out sample job descriptions as drawn up by MSBA lawyers and asked the Board to review them before the next Board meeting.

C. The Westby/Grenora Girls' Basketball Bus Driver position was discussed. Sorenson moved to offer Cathy Nordhagen a contract for the 2009/10 season, Westgard seconded, AIF. Mr. Koterba noted that a driver with a CDL will be needed for Boys' Basketball. He also noted that the Boys' Basketball Assistant Coaching position is open as Joe Eberle will not be able to serve in that capacity this year.

D. Mr. Koterba stated that we currently have one student custodian but will need another one for vacations and the summer months. He will advertise that position also.

E. Chairman Ryals read a letter of resignation from Wayne Koterba. Ryals then moved to accept Mr. Koterba's resignation, effective July 1, 2010, Meyer seconded, AIF.

F. The Westby School Board of Trustees have contracted with the MREA to conduct the Superintendent search.

Announcements/Discussion

A. MTSBA legal training will take place on Wed, November 18, 2009 at the Plentywood School from 6-8:00 p.m. All Board members are encouraged to attend.

B. The Superintendent evaluation will not be necessary due to Mr. Koterba's resignation.

C. Mr. Koterba stated that the non-tenured teacher evaluations are nearly complete. Mr. Somppi stated that he has yet to begin the tenured teacher evaluations.

D. The employee Christmas party and gift were discussed. It was decided to have a sit down dinner at the Prairie Kitchen, possibly December 5th or 6th and to present each employee with a \$35 gift certificate, to be redeemed at any Westby business.

WDC MEETING MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Westby Development Corporation was held November 16th, 2009, at the community center Brenda Ryals called the meeting to order at 7:40 with board members Jody Lagerquist, Suzi Ekness, Val Moore, Leann Westgard present and one guest Steve Ekness.

After Suzi asked the last names be added to the roll call, the secretary's October minutes were revised and placed on file.

The Treasurer's financial report was presented. Previous balance was \$7,892.50 with a new balance of \$8,300.26 The Border News Account stands at \$552.8. A balance of \$519.64 remains in the saving account and the Prairie Fest fund holds \$776.87. New bills: property tax on vacant lot of \$7.88. Val made a motion to pay, Leann second AIF. Brenda asked for preapproval to pay deposit on contracts for Ultimate Sound Machine and JUMP-N-FUN-INFLATBLES when they come in- Suzi made that motion, Jody second AIF. Brenda noted a \$200.00 donation from the Lion's Club to help defray the expense of the Prairie Fest. A \$200.00 donation from Alfred Aufdemberge to the community for their help while he and his wife were stranded here with his keys locked in the car will be earmarked for the museum.

Old Business:

MUSEUM:

Jody reported he, Don Christensen and Steve Ekness went through the Crystal Bar and it is beyond repair. The floor in the back room is falling in and with the roof leaking in places it is not feasible. Val will inform the commissioners about the condition of the building and see if it can put on their agenda to demolish it as it is a hazard.

Jody, Don and Steve also did a walkthrough of Gladys Wirtzberger's old place. There are some minor repairs that will need to be done, but the consensus was it could work for a museum. The WDC likes the idea of a Main Street location and the history the building brings. Suzi did check with owner Bill Dodge about a price and he is asking \$2,000.00. Suzi's recommendation is she will check with Farmer's Union about buying the propane tank and remaining fuel on the premises and see if Bill will settle for the proceeds of the sale. The board agreed the building was not worth \$2,000.00, but will work with him on coming to terms. The board would remind him the WDC has a 501 3C status and a donation would be tax deductible.

SHOOTING RANGE:

Josh Marottek presented a financial report for the shooting range. The land lease has been paid, services (electricity installed), materials and equipment bought for a total of \$11,544.30. Remaining funds stand at \$6,544.79.

WEB SITE

Steve Ekness presented the address for the community of Westby web site. The address is www.westbymontana.com. He noted he has paid for the westbymontana domain for two years at a price of \$20.00 per year. The price to be on this site he has chosen is a one-time cost of \$199.00. Val motioned and Leann second we reimburse Steve for these expenses (\$239.00). AIF. Steve talked about how search engines work and what we need to do to make the site come up farther in searches. He will continue to update and add links to the site. Rental properties, real estate for sale, and major coming events will be among the things listed on the site.

PRAIRIE FEST

July 10, 2010, is scheduled date of Prairie Fest. Val reported two separate class reunions are being organized for PF weekend, the Westby and Comertown classes of 1946-1949 and the WHS classes of 1958-1962.

The raffle continues for two hundred pound bundles of hamburger with tickets selling for \$5.00 or 3 for \$10.00 with the money to be used to help fund the PF. The drawing will be December 16th at the school Christmas program.

Val reported verifying the dates for the "JUMP-N-FUN-INFLATBLES" in Williston. They would like a \$100.00 deposit to hold the date. Brenda is waiting for the contract from Ultimate Karaoke.

Val noted she talked to Arlene Hove President of the Quilt Club about doing a quilt show for PF. She would check with the group, but felt they would be in favor. Val also talked to Nate Olson about chainsaw carving demo and he would be happy to do it if he is around. He also mentioned having some sort of event at the shooting range during that time. Suzi talk to Kirk (falcon guy) and he too, will have a demo with his birds if he is available. Val mentioned the company from Williston with the inflatables also is getting into face painting. She will check with them on prices. Meyer moved to approve payment of November payroll warrants #10474-10486 totaling \$92,139.98, and November claims warrants #15337-15385 totaling \$82,628.29. Westgard seconded the motion for payment approval, AIF.
