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## CONTRACTOR HAS WESTBY ROOTS

“There is no lack of work to be done.” That, in a nutshell, is what brought Rob Dickinson and his construction company to Westby, but it wasn't his first trip. Dickinson's (a native of Lincoln, Montana) roots run deep in Westby. His great-grandparents Bernie and Marian Schultz, as well as his grandparents Lloyd and Helen Schultz, were Westby natives and his Mother, Marian (Bunnie), was born and raised here. Bunnie and her siblings bought their grandparents home in Westby several years ago and restored it for a summer and hunting get-away for their various families. Recently, the oil industry brought Bunnie and her husband to -



town on a more permanent basis, at least for awhile, and this in turn brought Rob to the area to check out its potential. On a trip to Westby in July, Dickinson inquired about purchasing lots for new construction as he could see the housing shortage that existed. A deal was made with Violet Bartnes for several lots and the trailer home in which she had lived while a resident of Westby. Dickinson, who has been in the business for close to 20 years, has been busy ever since. The trailer was brought up to par and Rob and his wife, Pat, now call it home. A storage garage was built adjacent to the trailer and plans are underway for an apartment building or duplex to be built on the adjoining lots at a future date.

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

## CHOCOLATE CAKE w/ NUTTER BUTTER FROSTING

1 PKG Devil's Food cake mix  
1 1/3 cups water  
3 eggs  
1/2 cup canola oil  
4 cups marshmallow cream (2 16oz jars)  
1 cup mini chocolate chips  
1 cup butter, softened  
1 1/2 cups peanut butter  
Chocolate shavings or peanuts for garnish  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees, coat 2-9 inch round cake pans with cooking spray. At medium speed beat cake mix, water, eggs and oil until blended, 1 minute. Increase speed to med-hi and beat until light and fluffy, 2 minutes. Fold in 1 cup of marshmallow cream, and stir until almost completely incorporated. Some streaks may remain. Stir in chocolate chips. Divide batter between pans. Bake 30 -35 minutes or until toothpick inserted in to centers comes out clean. Cool on racks 10 minutes. Remove from pans; cool completely.  
Frosting: With mixer at medium high speed beat butter and peanut butter until smooth and fluffy about 2 minutes. Add remaining marshmallow cream and beat until blended an additional 1-2 minutes. Place one cake layer on serving plate; spread with 1 1/2 cups frosting. Top with remaining cake layer and spread top and side with remaining frosting. Swirl with back of spoon and garnish with chocolate and peanuts. Note: Divide batter into 24 cupcake liners, bake 16-18 minutes, cool, frost, and garnish.  
Another recipe of Chel's to share. He served this to us on our last trip to California and it was wonderful. It is such an easy dish to prepare, but an elegant presentation. The flavors blend beautifully. The acid in the lemons, the salty capers and the crisp prosciutto are perfect compliments to the mild halibut. Any whitefish will work, but be very careful with the cooking and baking time. You may choose to finish a thinner fillet on the stovetop. Roasted vegetables, rice, or mashed potatoes would all complete the meal beautifully.

## PAN-ROASTED HALIBUT WITH PROSCIUTTO, LEMON, WHITE WINE, AND CAPERS

1/2 cup flour  
Salt and freshly ground salt and pepper  
2 (6-ounce) halibut fillets  
Extra-virgin olive oil  
3 tablespoons butter  
2 slices prosciutto, cut into strips  
1/2 cup white wine  
1/2 lemon, juiced  
2 teaspoons capers  
2 tablespoons chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley plus whole sprigs, for garnish  
Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Put the flour on a deep plate or in a shallow bowl and season well with salt and pepper. Dredge the fish in the flour. Put a large skillet over medium-high heat, add 1 tablespoon oil and the butter and get the skillet hot. Add the fillets and cook until browned on 1 side, 2 to 3 minutes. At the same time, add the prosciutto and cook, stirring, to brown. Then flip the fish, put the skillet in the oven, and roast until the fish is just cooked through, about 10 minutes (he says less, about 8 minutes).  
Remove the fish to 2 serving plates. Dump the prosciutto out onto paper towels to drain. Put the skillet back over medium heat. Add another tablespoon olive oil, the white wine, lemon juice, capers, the remaining 2 tablespoons butter and the parsley and bring to a boil; boil until reduced and thickened. Season with salt and pepper. Pour the sauce over the fish, top with the prosciutto, and serve immediately.

NOTE: Prosciutto is fairly easy to attain now, but if want to use thin slices of bacon in place of, once again, adjust the cooking time to attain the crispness.

# School Board Meeting Minutes

Regular Meeting  
September 12, 2011  
7:00 P.M.

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Westby School District #3 was held on September 12, 2011. Brenda Ryals, Vance Meyer, Brant Cartwright, Jim Sundsted, Aldon Joyes, Mr. Holecek, Mr. Somppi and Donna Sorenson were in attendance. Chairman Ryals called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m.

Visitor at the meeting was Suzi Ekness.

The tentative agenda was reviewed, followed by a motion by Meyer to approve, seconded by Sundsted, AIF.

Arlene read the minutes of the August 15, 2011 meeting. Following one correction, these minutes were approved and placed on file.

The Board reviewed the Clerk's July financial report.

**Public Comment:** None

**Committee Reports:** Buildings & Grounds: Meyer reported that the basement has been excavated and forms are ready for the footings to be poured at the site for the new teacherage. The contractor hopes to pour footings the beginning of next week and should have the basement walls constructed before Jensens are ready to begin construction on the house.

Mr. Holecek reported that the Deed has been recorded and Title Insurance received for the lots that the Board approved the purchase of at the last meeting.

Mr. Holecek reported that he and Mike Gebhardt will inspect the deck on the Garman house and report back to the Board on what needs to be done.

**Unfinished Business:**

A. None

**New Business:**

A. Mr. Holecek informed the board that the printer/copier in the office is not compatible with the school's new Windows 7 operating system. The machine is over 10 years old and cannot be upgraded. Mr. Holecek presented information on possible replacements. Sundsted made a motion to purchase a Sharp MXC402SC color copier/printer from Gaffaneys. Meyer seconded the motion, AIF

B. Mr. Holecek explained to the board that the student council is planning to hold some fund-raisers to purchase additional items for the student lounge area, but that they currently don't have an extracurricular account. Joyes made a motion to add an extracurricular activity account for Student Council, Joyes seconded the motion and all voted in favor.

C. Mr. Holecek informed the board that other area schools have been participating in a procurement card system offered through the MT Association of School Business Officials. This system is more user-friendly and imposes fewer fees than our current credit card provider, and offers rebates to members based on the amount of purchases made during the year. Meyer made a motion authorizing Mr. Holecek and Mrs. Sorenson to apply for membership in the procurement card program. Joyes seconded the motion and all voted in favor.

D. Mr. Holecek explained that currently the cost of officials such as score keepers, line-judges and referees for sports events is more than the income received from Activity tickets and ticket sales. Following discussion the board decided to table the matter until figures can be compiled for the year for all activities, thus providing the board the most accurate information before considering any changes.

E. Mr. Holecek presented a list of possible substitute co-op van drivers. Sundsted moved to approve the list as presented; Meyer seconded the motion, AIF.

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

## History of Westby, Montana

Note: This history of Westby is written in "Sheridan's Daybreak" published in 1970. Centennial Central will run consecutive columns to tell the story.

### HISTORY OF WESTBY, MONTANA

Horace Greely said, "Go west, young man, go west." Many did go west but not many picked up their town and moved it with them as Westby did.

The first homesteaders started coming into the northeast corner of Montana and the northwest corner of North Dakota in 1905 and 1906. The earliest one recorded was in 1903 when Sig Nelson drove a herd of cattle up from Nelson Lakes south of Minot, North Dakota. He came alone, and the trip took three weeks. He later took up a homestead but was here six years before the land was open to homesteading. They could homestead in North Dakota at this time, but Montana did not open up to homesteading until 1908; and the first ones to come were called "squatters". This meant that they came in and picked out their 320 acres and built a shack; then they squatted there until they could file for homesteads. Sig's cattle, those of a Mr. Ueland and John Rice (who came to Westby in 1906), ran loose until the homesteaders took up their land and put up fences. Also in the fall of 1906, Peter Andersen and Walter Olsen took land here, built a shack and returned east for the winter.

These early pioneers either drove up cattle or came by train. After they got to the end of the railroad, they had to come across country by horseback or horse and wagon the 30 to 60 miles, depending on when they came and where they homesteaded. Times were not so pleasant for these homesteaders. It was slow work turning the sod with oxen hitched to a fourteen-inch plow, moving at about two miles an hour. Horses were much faster, but they had to be fed oats, whereas, oxen did fairly well on the adequate supply of prairie grass.

The August Extracurricular Financial Report was reviewed followed by a motion by Sundsted to approve; Cartwright seconded the motion, AIF.

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# WDC ANNUAL REPORT 2011

The Westby Development Corporation began their 22<sup>st</sup> year on July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2011. The annual report for July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2010, - June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2011, is as follows.

With a nine member board in place those up for re-election included Val Moore, Kolby Ruggles, Jody Lagerquist, and Cyndie Paulson. Val, Kolby, and Jody have agreed to another 2-year term. Cindy Bjorgen Stenjem has agreed to fill Cyndie's position. Members and officers elected in July, 2010 were: Val Moore, President; Kolby Ruggles, VP; Brenda Ryals, Treasurer; Suzi Ekness, Secretary; board members-Leann Westgard, Jody Lagerquist, Don Christensen, Al Joyes, and Cindy Stenjem.

The WDC received a quick claim deed on the Ollie & Gladys Wirtzberger home for the future site of a Westby museum. A museum board was formed including Jody from the WDC board and four members from the community- at- large. The other members include Marlene Anderson, Dick Johnson, Arletta Herman, and Rob Rust.

A very successful Prairie Fest 2010 was held on July 10<sup>th</sup>, 2010, in conjunction with two class reunions-1946-1950 & 1958-1962.

Guest speakers this year included Drew Henry a biologist for Fish, Wildlife, & Parks and Arlin Kaul, Director of the local Border Patrol.

The WDC worked with WHS history and art teacher Nate Olson on the development of new brochure promoting the community and school. The WDC agreed to sell two lots on 2nd Ave West to Westby School for a teacherage.

A grant proposal was written to the Sheridan County Foundation for the museum. An award of \$2,500.00 was received towards restoration of the building.



Besides the Prairie Fest, ongoing WDC projects include publishing *the Westby Border News*, and a yearly scholarship awarded to a WDC's member's child who does an approved community service project. The online edition of the *Border News* had to find a new home after the old Geocities site was closed down. The new site is [www.wbn.yolasite.com](http://www.wbn.yolasite.com). The publisher, Tracy Johanson, was also able to archive the back issues of the *Border News* on the site.



## HISTORY OF WESTBY (continued)

Many pioneers also experienced what the wind could do. One man moved his shack to a new location then went to his brother's house for dinner. When he came back, he found his shack gone -- scattered by the wind all over the prairie. Wind, hail, prairie fires and blizzards all had to be fought. Nevertheless, one pioneer said, "To me it was quite a thrill to break up the new land. Was not I the first to break it up since God made the earth!" With kerosene lamps and lanterns for light, and coal for the stoves to heat their modest homes, these pioneers looked forward to better times. These people were a brave breed who did not complain and never lost heart.

The second part of our story had to do with a group of Danes in the northwestern corner of North Dakota, who decided to start a town in 1909. An application was made for a post office to be called Westby. This name was chosen because "By" in Dane means "town", and it would be the most westerly town in North Dakota; thus, it was named West Town or Westby. The application was granted and a James Hansen became the first postmaster. Ed Simonson drove the first star route between Ambrose, Skermo Post Office and later to Westby. A Mr. J.P. Neve set up a blacksmith shop, Nels Nelson agreed to build a store and sent out a man, Oliver Sannerud, to operate it.


The first lumber yard and bank were started by Harold Borg. Jacob Freund ran a feedbarn, and thus the town of Westby was situated until the rumor that the Soo Line would probably extend their rails westward from Ambrose to the North Dakota-Montana border. This caused a furor of excitement, and when the railroad was assured, the town was picked up and moved to the North Dakota line ("a city on a railroad") to await the long dreamed of rail. REMEMBER! This was during the days of Prohibition in North Dakota, so the saloons were located on Montana soil. This, as one narrator put it, "split the town with the business 'improper' on one side of the line and the business 'proper' on the other side."

The pioneer homesteaders who had settled here could really appreciate the opening of the railroad; no more 40-mile trips for supplies in the dead of winter; no more men or teams lost in blizzards. When the railroad did plot a town, however, the town on the North Dakota line was ignored. It seems that railroad rates for Montana were higher than those in North Dakota, and so with typical financial acumen, the officials placed the new town on the Montana side of the line. Thus the business section thereupon abandoned the North Dakota site, and in 1914 the town was moved into Montana. The first person to be a Montana resident in Westby was Henry Reuter, the Immigration Officer. His first office was a box car. Henry Reuter was also the first mayor before Westby's incorporation -- being the only eligible candidate for that office. *to be continued...*
